Workshop News

Many traditional societies have a cycle of events throughout the year that provide a focus and structure for that society. The thirteen moons in native societies were each identified by particular expectations and activities. Other societies recognized and focused on the first return of the salmon, the first cherry blossoms, the first frost and so forth. The annual cycle of events guiding the Brock House woodworkers has always been the Summer Fair held in July and the Winter Fair held in November. The woodworkers carry out a wide variety of projects and repairs throughout the year but the intensity of the activity in the workshop always goes up as the dates of the fairs creep closer and each person tries to complete one more item for the sales. A bit like the change in activity in Santa's workshop between mid-January and mid December. This focus meant that we were gobsmacked to learn that the Summer Fair was cancelled for 2018. The astonishment led to despair when we thought about the inventory of advanced strum sticks, bowls, boxes,

toys, cutting boards, tables, planters, pot hangers, stools and looms in our current inventory and realized that we had no market. Fortunately, all of the workers are resilient and in a short while everyone was bringing up suggestions such as weekly sales from the office or the workshop. We are currently planning to provide additional planters for the Garden event on May 10 as well as scheduling a woodcraft sale July in [see p. 9]. If you know of other accessible markets, please let us know.

1/4C Oat Bran


Toast in a 400-degree oven for 5 minutes.
