Many of you have probably heard the Brock House Orchestra rehearsing on Wednesday mornings in the Begg Room. Other than at the Summer Fair, there are few opportunities to hear the orchestra in house. But that will change!

On **Thursday, June 8**, the orchestra is teaming up with the Elgar Strings of Burnaby for a joint concert. This will give the Brock House Orchestra access to more string players and the Elgar a chance to play with woodwinds and brass. This will form a full symphony orchestra, which is probably a first for Brock House Society. There will be around fifty enthusiastic players in the combined groups.

The two conductors have chosen a program of French and English music from the 19th and 20th centuries. There will also be a violin soloist, Amanda Hsueh who will play the *Introduction and Rondo Capriccioso* by Camille Saint-Saëns. This is a spectacular piece originally written for the Spanish virtuoso Pablo de Sarasate.

The concert will take place in the tent at Brock House beginning at 1:45 pm. This promises to be an exciting afternoon of music making. Don't miss it!

New roof for the shed now completed!

After numerous frustrating delays owing to this spring's consistently wet weather, the Brock House Society Woodworkers have now completed the new roof to the east side of the workshop and storage building. The team, led by J. J. Lemieux, found a three-day dry interval in the week of May 8 and went hard at it until it was done.

Team members were Chris Hilsden, David Young, Bob Haxton, Alex Law, Jim Burge, and Ron Nielson. This was an impressive voluntary effort which saved the Society as much as \$3,000 compared with using an outside contractor. And on that note, it should be emphasized that voluntary effort led by workshop convener Susan Lamb through 2016 also netted Brock House Society about \$5,000 in sales of handmade items at our summer and Christmas fairs. Well done and many thanks to all!

Workshop News

Some people walk past the woodworking displays at the summer and winter fairs because they have down-sized and already have too many bowls, cutting boards, tables, stools and wooden trinkets. However, even if they have no intention of buying they should take the time to look at the displays because the worked wood always looks nice.

Stopping to look and talk will also encourage the woodworkers and might lead to the revelation that some of the wares are deceptive. For example, some bowls and boxes have special purposes that are not obvious without checking closely.

Ages ago when the heroes in western movies wore white hats and the villains wore black the local woodworkers could be counted on to make large pine boxes for the local residents in Boothill. The Brock House woodworkers do not make coffins but they have made special boxes like the imaged urn to store sentimental ashes following cremation. A typical urn is approximately six inches on each side for a total volume of approximately 200 cubic inches but urns for favorite pets could be much smaller. Some open at the top, others open from the bottom. Some are cubes, others are cylinders. All of them can be customized with particular types of wood. All of them look like attractive boxes.

If you know of a need for a small custom made box for any purpose be sure to look at the bargains in the summer fair or contact the Workshop Coordinator at the Brock House workshop on Thursday morning or e-mail wramey@interchange.ubc.ca with "Brock House Projects" in the subject line. Even if you do not need an urn be sure to check out the items at the summer fair to see if the boxes are actually boxes. It might be interesting.

Scammers highjack Vancouver police call-display number

Con-artists make it look like VPD is calling and then demand money for unpaid taxes



If you get a call from the Vancouver Police Department's non-emergency number and are told you owe the government money, you are being scammed.

Con-artists have manipulated call-display to make it appear that they are calling from the VPD's 604-717-3321 number. Then they say they are representatives of the Canada Revenue Agency and demand money for unpaid taxes.

Police are advising the public that the VPD's non-emergency line is used for reporting non-emergency police situations, and would not be used to solicit for any organization or individual.

The CRA:

- never requests prepaid credit cards
- never asks for information about your passport, health card, or driver's licence
- never shares your taxpayer information with another person, unless you have provided the appropriate authorization
- never leaves personal information on your answering machine or asks you to leave a message containing your personal information on an answering machine

- When in doubt, ask yourself the following:
- Is there a reason that the CRA may be calling? Do I have a tax balance outstanding?
- Is the requester asking for information I would not include with my tax return?
- Is the requester asking for information I know the CRA already has on file for me?
- How did the requester get my email address or telephone number?

Am I confident I know who is asking for the information?
