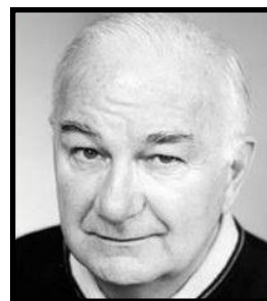

This will help guide us through the uncharted territory of the upcoming year.

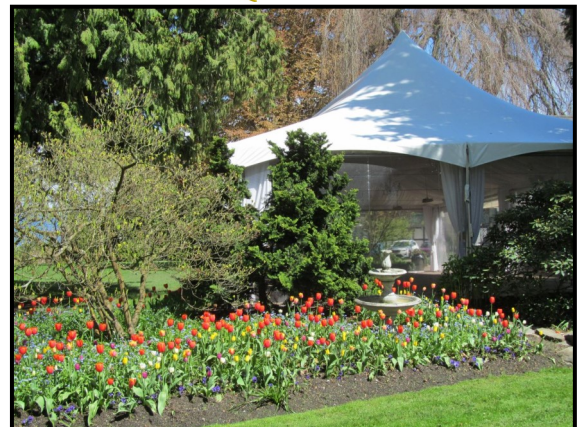
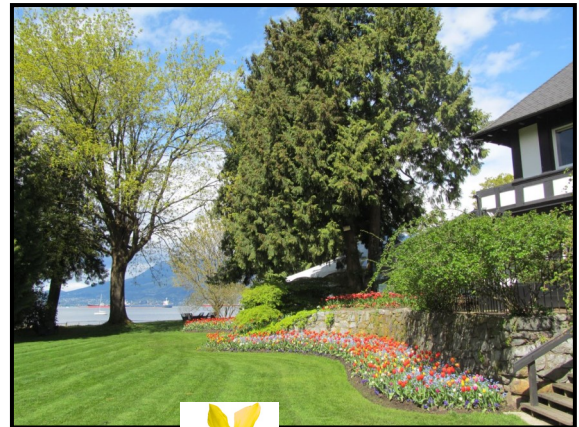

Brock House/Kerrisdale Choir

The Brock House Choir held their semi-annual performance in early February to a large enthusiastic crowd. Audience and choir alike shared the joy of music and fellowship. The following week the choir also performed the same concert for the lunchtime crowd at Kerrisdale Seniors Center.

The same day, right after performing in Kerrisdale Seniors Center the choir began a new set of songs. Preparing a new group of songs and retiring the old is a very busy time for our two librarians Elisabeth Caton and Philip Bragg (at the most intensive times they recruit help from Phil's wife Diana and Juliet Helliwell). The job of choir librarian is the most time consuming of the volunteer jobs that keep the choir running.

At the beginning of each term our director Elsie Stephen gives the songs she has chosen to the Elisabeth and Phil. Every piece must be carefully numbered 1 - 60 to correspond with each chorister's name. Some of the songs need to be printed, collated and stapled. Sixty individual folders are made up - one for every choir member. Elsie may bring another song or two in during the semester and each of these songs has to go through the same process and be distributed. A similar reverse process happens at the end of the semester - Phil and Elisabeth gather all the folders at our last concert and file them away.

All this work happens two times a year - in the fall then again after January when Phil and Elisabeth must repeat the steps for the next set we will perform in the spring.

If you ask Philip or Elisabeth how long they have been librarians they shrug, they do not know. But you can ask Philip's wife Diana, she will look it up for you. Philip and Elisabeth have been Brock House Choir Librarians since September 2009 - 8 years! Many thanks to you both for your dedication and hard work.

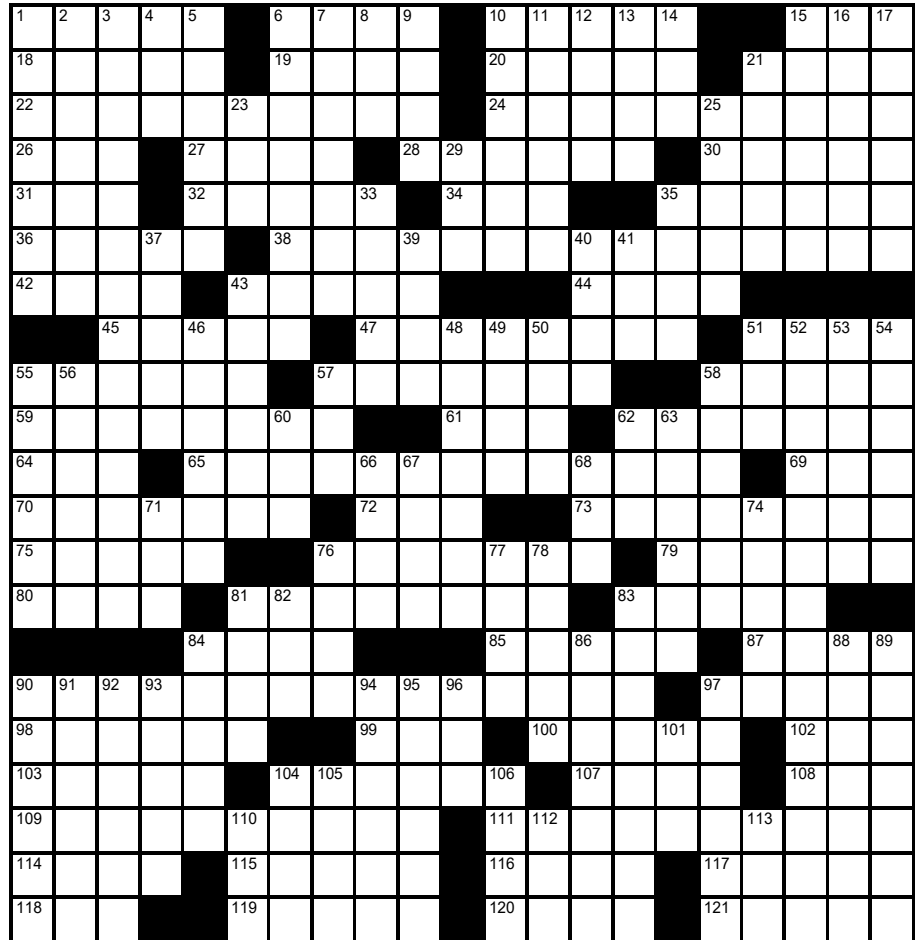

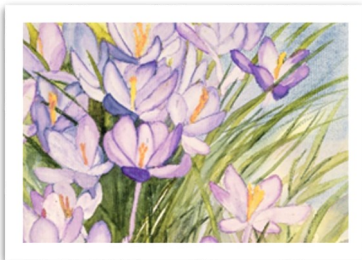

A Very "Uneventful" Trip to Hornby Island

Our friends Eike and Boye Ahlborn and their three children Birgid, Karen and Dorit have a lovely place on Hornby Island...paradise pure! Hornby Island is absolutely beautiful. To get to Hornby one has to take three ferries, which makes the trip rather lengthy.

The Ahlborns invited us to come for the weekend. Lovely! We are packed and ready Friday afternoon and heading for Horseshoe Bay in our VW camper bus, only to find that the ferry line-up is already at least a kilometer long. "Hey Jochen, I see the Ahlborns are about 4 cars ahead of us." Wunderbar!

After a while Jochen announces that he really really needs to go to the bathroom. No bathroom in sight! Travelling with three small children in a camper van makes it necessary to have a little potty "accompanying" us at all times. Well, poor Jochen has to make do with that. "Jochen, I am moving the car forward should the line move..." (those were the days when Jochen was the absolute boss/king in the holiday-driving department). A very stern "NO" is his answer. Okaayy!and then the cars are all moving...but we are not! I am in an absolute panic when a VW bus drives by and zips right into the empty space in front of us. "Jooochen!"

Finally Jochen is done and sits in "his" driver's seat and discovers what happened and immediately is enraged: "I am going to tell that guy off, he just can't do that." Me: "You should have let me drive the car forward." But on and on he goes and I am hanging on to him begging him not to get out of the car to confront that guy. Now that "horrible person" gets out of his car.....wow!.....he looks like a giant gang member, shaved head, muscles bulging and tattoos all over him. Of course he knows that Jochen is very mad at him and points to the back of his car where we see three teeth-flashing Rottweiler dogs looking as if they wouldn't mind taking some chunks out of Jochen. Oh Boy, what a situation to be in! Now Jochen is determined to talk to some Ferry Official once we reach the Ferry Terminal and we argue back and forth and finally reach the pay booth still fighting about the situation. Then I look up and see a ferry moving out of the dock.....and the Ahlborns are on it and standing right beside them is "that guy" waving, waving. What? We should be on that ferry too! What happened? Well, it turns out that with all the arguing and anger between us we somehow ended in the wrong ferry line-up...we are actually in the line-up to Bowen Island instead of Vancouver Island. Several hours later we are on the little ferry to Denman Island, racing across the island to catch the final ferry to Hornby Island only to discover that we missed the last ferry.

By now it is dark outside, time to look for a hotel or a Bed and Breakfast. There is no way we can sleep in our camper. We have a 12 foot aluminum boat on top and the inside is packed to capacity. We find no hotel on the island; finally we see a little sign "Bed and Breakfast". In we go; the hosts only have a small bedroom with a double bed available. They offer one piece of foam to squeeze in beside the bed and a wall. We bring in our own sleeping bags, and make-do with Tanya and Kirsten on the foamy and Nils squished in between us and actually manage to get a good nights sleep after all.

Breakfast the next morning: We are actually on a little hobby farm, something we did not see last night in the darkness. The breakfast table is nicely set with all sorts of homemade jams, bread, muffins, granola, fruit etc. The children each get a glass of milk. Then Kirsten whispers: "Mami, I can't drink this. That is not milk...it tastes horrible." I try it.....yuck! It turns out they had milked their goats. What are we going to do? Nils at the time is 22 months old and still drinking from a bottle. Secretly I pour all the milk in 2 of his bottles.....and then Nils demands his bottle, takes a sip and....swoosh....the bottle flies across the room. How embarrassing! I hope our hosts did not notice.

By 7:30 a.m. we are on the ferry and we have to explain and tell our adventures to our friends. We have a wonderful weekend after that...divorce court forgotten!

Workshop News

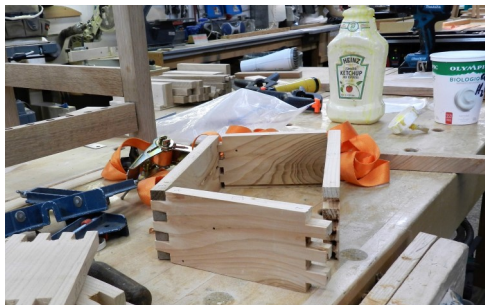
Much of the wood work done in the shop is small projects that can be carried back and forth from the shop to storage at home. This limitation is mandated by the limited space available in the shop. This means that the shop is a good place to work on small wooden projects such as boxes, bowls, canes, cutting boards, night tables, planters, stools and toys.

Despite the size limitation, larger projects do show up in the shop if the woodworker is constructing the project off-site but needs to temporarily use the machinery in the shop to shape the parts. For example, Alan is planning to make a small row boat but needs to use the saw and the planer to cut the long boards for the

gunwales and keel to suitable dimensions. Similarly, Barry is constructing a rustic colonial style cupboard. It is eight feet long and thirty-nine inches high so it dominated an entire work bench but it needed to be partially assembled in the shop to ensure that the successive boards fit together.

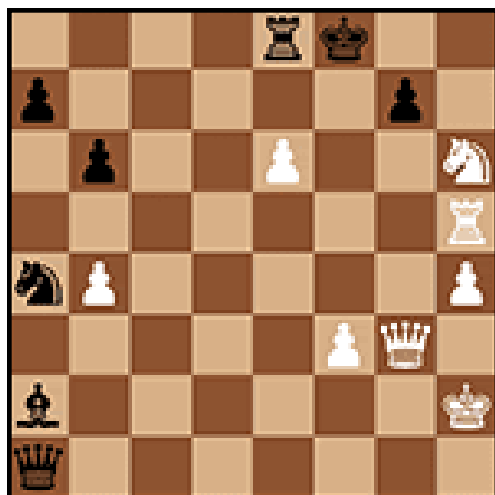
Brock House Chess Club

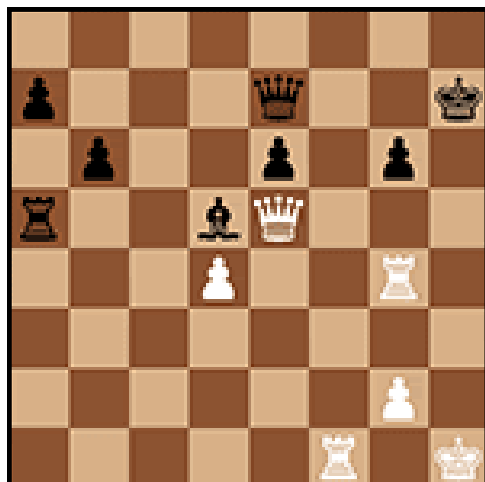

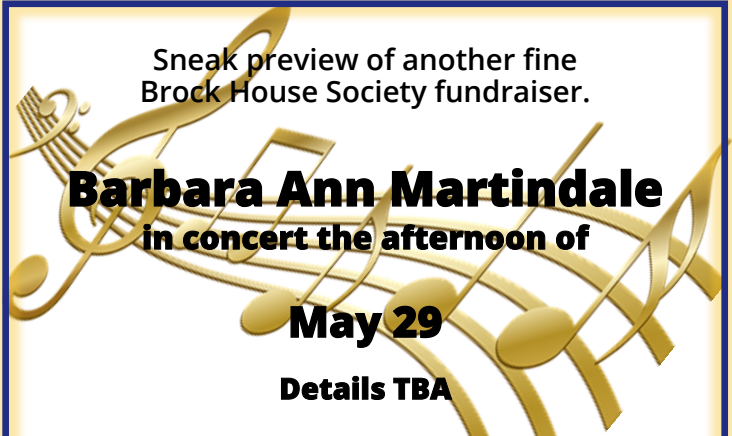
