

## **Workshop News**

The much anticipated renovation in the southern end of the work shop is nearing completion. The new sink and an improved lumber storage rack have been installed. This expanded space arrives just in time to accommodate the spate of new workers taking the mandatory orientation that allows them to work in the shop.



In other news, it is nice that we live in a relatively enlightened world where everyone, including people entering the third age of retirement can pursue their interests. ## **"How do I Greet thee? Let me Count the Ways!"**

This is just a gentle reminder on behalf of the thirty-eight people who volunteer to welcome you each time you come to Brock House.

Most members are really delightful but there are a very few who seem to resent showing their card for some reason and take it out on the poor Greeter - a loud sigh, rolled eyes, a mutter about the "card Gestapo", even a flat refusal!

But checking cards is the main part of the job; it ensures that everyone is a member, that no one who is unauthorized gains access, that we don't have strangers wandering about, and that everyone who comes in is dealt with in a courteous, friendly way. This is basic security - and not uncommon in most private societies. I have to show my fob next door every time I go in, but cursing the greeter does no good...it is a machine!

Yes, we do know it can be a hassle to get out your card each time.

And when you know the person on the desk, it probably seems really, really silly. We get that.

But imperfect though it is, the system has to be "one size fits all". Some greeters are new and might not recognize any of you. Or you might pop back in to Brock one day when the greeter has changed and be asked again. If one member sees another just waltz in without showing anything he wonders why, and things get awkward.

So just quickly flash us (cards only, please!) and all will be well. Should you not have your card with you, we will be only too happy to check your name in the book and all will be well.

One of the most versatile and charismatic musicians in the world, Bramwell Tovey is a Grammy Award-winning conductor and a renowned composer and jazz pianist. Music director of the Vancouver Symphony, principal guest conductor of the Los Angeles Philharmonic at the Hollywood Bowl, and founding host and conductor of the New York Philharmonic's Summertime Classics, Tovey is also in demand as a guest conductor around the globe. Growing up in East London, he played piano, tuba, and violin by the time he was a teenager. Famed for his amusing, erudite, and delightfully irreverent remarks from the stage, he's, as one critic put it, "...the witty bloke everybody wants to sit next to at the pub.

Christine Samson sent in a wonderful article "Remembering Richard "Dick" Stace-Smith, 1924-2017" by Bev Ramey from the Summer 2017 issue of *BC Nature* magazine. Dick was, a founding member and past president of Federation of BC Naturalists (FBCN now BC Nature). It's a super read and too long to reproduce in our little newsletter. There's one paragraph that I will share because it jumped out at me amidst the accolades about Dick's work and descriptions of his and his lovely wife Joan's many contributions to our community:

Sound familiar? Dick and Joan were, of course, long-time Brock House Society members, Dick was our most recent Honorary President.

# **The Welsh Miners**

Two black giants stood  
framed in the doorway,  
coal-black faces, big smiles  
concealing their weariness.  
*"Is this he, the little lad?  
Welcome, welcome, lad,"*  
one giant stooped, lifted me  
up high, and I felt wanted.

They strode to the large tin bath  
beside the fire, kissed the women,  
who scampered with kettles  
of hot water filling the tub.  
Father giant stripped, bathed

I hear the lilting Welsh, the music of it,  
I see the wife laughing,  
sponging his back, washing his hair,  
pouring water over his head.  
*The black man became white.*  
I'd never seen such loving before,  
such caring for their men.

He stood up in the tub,  
giant from the underworld,  
muscular figure silhouetted by  
the flickering flames  
of the fire behind the tub

Now the younger giant stripped,  
followed father, bathed, the ritual

I remember laughter and kindness

We sit, spotless white tablecloth,  
long table for ten,  
paraffin lamp swaying above. The miners in  
crisp white shirts, bowed heads,  
grace murmured reverently in Welsh  
That first night she tucked me up  
in bed, sang me a lullaby. I felt safe,  
knew I was home in this foreign land

Before dawn broke I peered down,  
saw them silently leave,  
helmet with lamp, metal lunch box,  
warm gloves, steep cobbled street,  
striding shoulder to shoulder through the  
fleeing night,  
the light, coal-tainted rain,  
clinging.

The mine head siren sounding the first shift,  
wailing and remorseless.

In later days I watch them at the shaft-head,  
lining up, then in the cage,  
descending,  
drill and axe firmly gripped,  
proud to be third generation  
Rhondda Valley miners.

On the seventh day we dress,  
shirt and tie, grey shorts for me,  
attend chapel, pray and sing  
strong basses and tenors,  
swelling contraltos, slow crescendos  
sounding, coursing, filling the vaulted ceiling  
of the small, greystone chapel.

On Saturdays the older boys take me,  
*'suffer the kid'*, they are told;  
we cycle past huge black slag hills,  
sharp-pointed accusingly to Heaven,  
scramble up the green hills  
surrounding our wounded valley.

The air is clean, the streams are clear,  
the gorse and bracken - no coal dust here.  
How green our valley was - long years ago!



## **Yarn and Needle Crafts**




