"My name is BRUCE"

The Brock House Jazz Band remembers Bruce Harrower

Vancouver Sun, May 8, 2018



Bruce did not like being called 'Scotty', and told me so, very firmly, in his unmistakeable Scottish brogue, the first time we met, 17 years ago. Good thing. You wouldn't want to get wrong-footed with Bruce. Over the years, we have often played side-by-side, initially in the Brock House Big Band, with fiddlers for many a Robbie Burns celebration (Bruce was a fine fiddler and played jigs and reels as only a Scot can), and more recently in the Brock House Jazz Band, where Bruce was the Director for 16 years, played drums, and later switched to playing his cornet.

Rob Arseneau remembers: When I first came to the band, I had never played this style of music, never improvised a solo, thought I would not be accepted because I played so badly. To my surprise Bruce asked me to come back the next week saying, "You'll be fine". If not for Bruce giving me the chance to play, it is unlikely I'd be playing at all, and I've never had this much fun playing music! Bruce was funny, cantankerous sometimes, but he loved the music and he loved playing for people. He was a good musician, and became my good friend. I'll miss him.

From Doug Rogerson: Bruce's talent on drums started in the mid 1950's. Bruce was a trumpeter in the British Army. When he injured some teeth and couldn't play his trumpet, the Band Leader told him to learn drums instead. So the world got a jazz drummer. Bruce also played in the Vancouver Fiddle Orchestra, and introduced me there, where I now play accordion for Scottish Country dances. I always enjoyed chewing the fat with Bruce, a fellow Scot from Edinburgh.

John Sloan remembers: Bruce as a fine musician, a lot of fun to play with, always ready with a joke, making him feel comfortable in the Brock House Jazz Band. Lively and a true Scot, Bruce was passionate about his music, and imparted that feeling to audiences and Band members.

Mike Higgins says: I've known Bruce for many years and played drums with him in the Jazz Band and in 'Men In Black'. All his engagements were fun and well attended. I'll miss his sense of humour.

Lorraine Foster: Regrets that only twice did she have the pleasure of singing with the band when Bruce was leader and so missed getting to know him; but enjoyed receiving the funny e-mails and cartoons that Bruce regularly forwarded to all of us.

Perhaps Bruce's greatest legacy to the Brock House Jazz Band is our digital inventory of hundreds of music charts which Bruce wrote on his computer, and which we continue to use. I inherited the care of that library, and have nothing but admiration for the effort he put into its creation.

From all of us, thank you, Bruce, for your music, friendship, enthusiasm and support.

May you rest in peace.

Brock House Chess Club

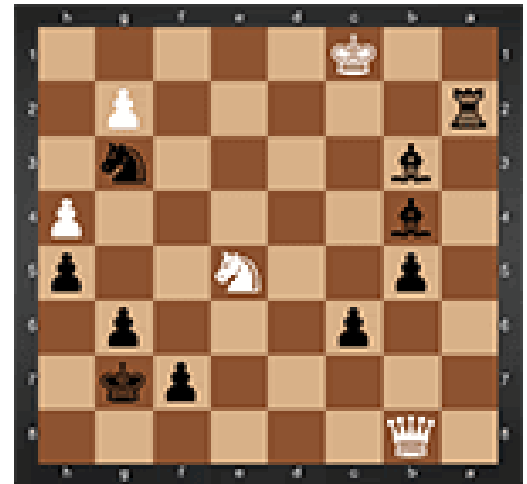

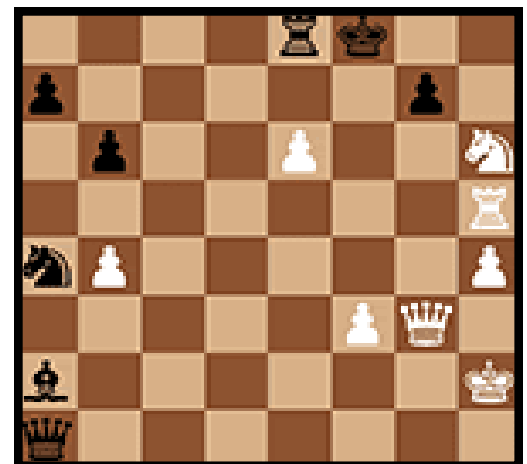

White moves, mate in 3



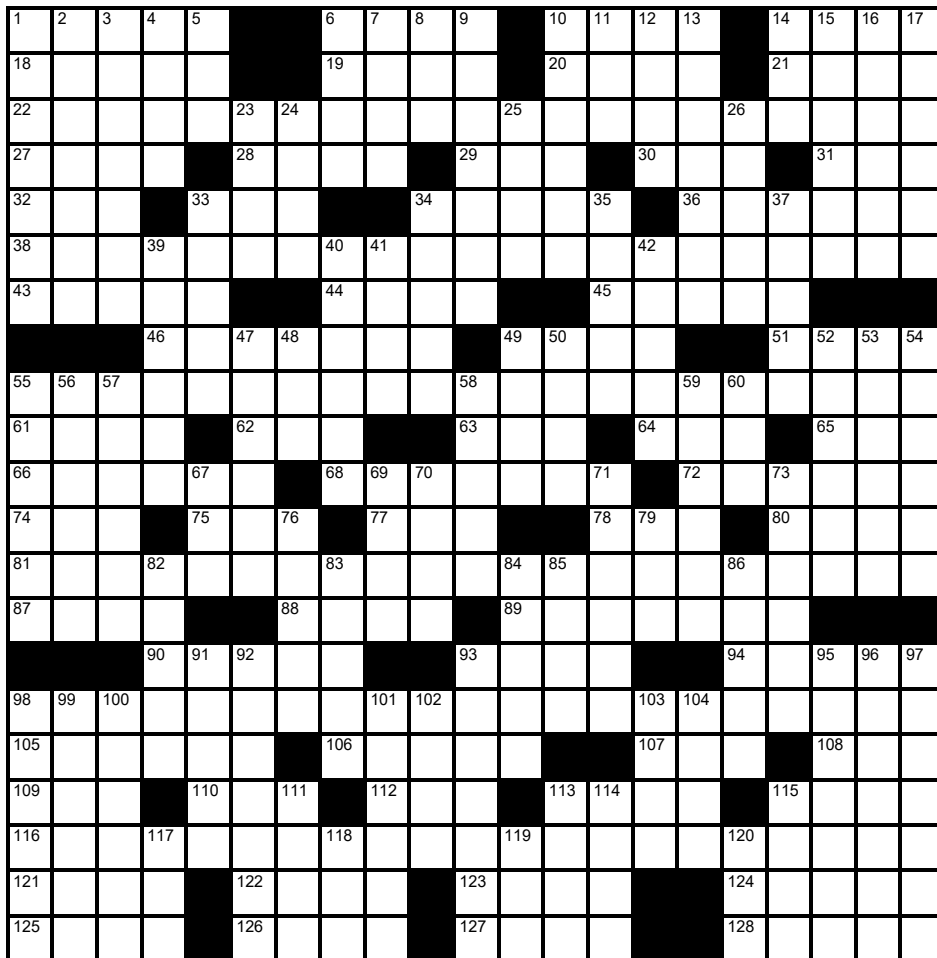

Workshop News

To improve the safety of the shop and enhance the efficiency of the shop users Jan Lasteen has been organizing a series of technical sessions to demonstrate and discuss operating principles, features and potential of the various types of equipment in the workshop. The sessions are randomly scheduled to accommodate the availability of the demonstrators. Notice of the sessions is distributed to the authorized workshop members that have completed an orientation session for using the shop.

The first session by Jan Lasteen covered the use of compressors and air tools. The second session by Wally Malinosky covered techniques for applying lacquer finishes. The third session by Jan covered routers and the safe use of routers. Some of the potential future sessions in the fall will cover the cut-off saws, effective sanding, effective clamping, sharpening drill bits and chisels, lathes, planes and wood identification.

If you are a member of the workshop you will receive an e-mail approximately a week before the session. If you are not a member of the workshop and wish to receive these notices, please contact the workshop convener and arrange a workshop orientation so you can be added to the mailing list.

In other news there was good demand for the cedar planters made by the workshop for the Garden Show on May 10. A few people came to the workshop after the Garden Show to order some custom made planters or one of the elegant yellow cedar benches made by Robin Nordman that were sold out at the show.

There was also a stunning attendance at the special session on the shape of wood on May 31. This session was intended to develop an informed understanding of the role of growth and water for establishing the properties of wood used in construction and fine woodworking. Since the audience was keenly interested and attentive for the whole two-hour session even though many of them were not active woodworkers, another general session on wood or woodworking will likely be scheduled for next spring.

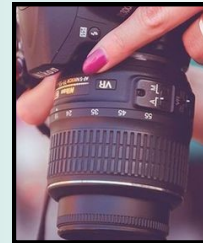

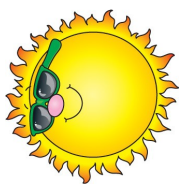
