From the President's Pen

I have mentioned the dimensions of seasonal change several times in *The President's Pen*, but we are presently undergoing a massive Spring structural change at BHS. That change is of course due to the leaving of Sophie, our Administrator on April 30.

Sophie was gracious enough to give us ample notice of her decision to retire so it did not come as a bolt out of the blue when I finally received her notice of resignation. However, she has big shoes to fill and she has been with us for 15 years. Over these years she has observed and overseen many changes in how BHS is able to deliver the numerous programs, events and services. This has been integrated into her thinking on many levels as to how she sees and does things, especially when problem solving. This is a unique perspective, which she will be required to share with her successor in whatever manner is deemed to be appropriate.

As soon as we received Sophie's formal resignation, we contacted a Personnel Agency and an immediate search took place. A selection team of 3 persons was drafted from the Human Resources Committee and interviews of prospective candidates took place following certain guidelines and criteria.

After 3 interviews the team were unanimous in their selection of **Joanne Enns** as the most suitable candidate. Joanne comes with a very strong background in all the key areas of work experience, gained from various levels of employment, that were deemed to be relevant to the position of Administrator.

Joanne will start with us on April 1 and will undergo a full month of orientation and training with Sophie before she leaves. So, if you are around the House at this time please introduce yourself to Joanne so that she can become acquainted with the diversity of our membership and the interests needs and expectations that you may have.

Some of these needs may be to spend time at Brock House doing something more meaningful! Well, how about volunteering?

We are still desperately short of volunteers in some key areas and any commitment that you can make would be much appreciated.

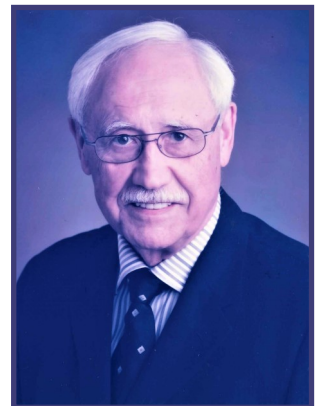

Jericho Lands Update

Drumming, dancing and singing welcomed the crowd to the opening of the policy development phase of the Jericho Lands project. Speakers from the First Nations ownership group stressed the importance of consultations and cooperation with the larger community as well as their great pride in being back on their traditional lands. The Canada Lands Company highlighted five years of partnership with the First Nations and the need for an authentic and robust community engagement. MP Joyce Murray spoke of the deep indigenous connections to the land and the necessity of applying world class principles to the design of what is probably the most significant development site in Canada. Mayor Kennedy Stewart stated that he is looking forward to working with the First Nations on a project that would help Vancouver live up to its title as "City of Reconciliation".

Following the ceremonies, we crowded the snack table, then studied up the many posters explaining the policy development process. Reconciliation will top the list of items to be covered. Types of housing, heights of buildings, building density, sustainability, parks, open spaces and mobility (transit, roads, bike routes and paths) will also be worked out. Knowledgeable City staffers answered our questions and City councillors mingled with the crowd. At one point I had a chat with the Deputy Mayor, not something I do every day.

The policy development process will take about 2 years. This will be followed by rezoning of the site. Permitting of individual buildings will follow the rezoning. Construction is not likely to start for 4 or 5 years from now.

To help ensure that Brock House Society is well represented in the policy development process, please go on to the City of Vancouver website [vancouver.ca] and type "Jericho Lands" into the search bar. Click the first site that appears [Jericho Lands], then scroll down till you find "Take Survey". On the 2nd page of the survey you will find the question "Are there any groups that you think should be included in the planning process?" Type in "Brock House Society" then go on to complete the survey. You can also find lots of other information on this site, including all the posters that we saw at the opening ceremonies.

A speaker series will accompany the policy development process, kicking off on April 17. You will have to contact the City for details.

Brock House Woodworkers

Most members likely know that the Brock House woodworkers craft a variety of woodwork projects such as bowls, cutting boards, wooden stools, canes, candlesticks, wooden boxes, wooden urns, pens, platters, TV stands, soap stands, tables, planters, nest boxes, bat boxes, strum sticks, benches, wooden toys, shelves, Kleenex box covers, tables, picture frames, natural edge slabs, rocking horses, beach chairs, luggage stands, looms and doors that are sold throughout the year for the Brock House Society. Some items are made to see if they might sell, some items are commissioned. As a service we also do minor restoration projects on old or broken wooden furniture. However, we often have difficulty choosing a suitable price for the various projects.

Most of the workers grew up when a penny was real money and a large, full size chocolate bar was a nickel so five or ten dollars seems like a reasonable price until we consider that this price equates the craft to the price of two or three chocolate bars in the modern world.

Some items such as wooden spoons might seem easy to price because stores like Walmart or Home Depot sell mass produced wooden spoons for a few dollars. Similarly, mass produced wooden bowls are available in the large chain stores for forty or fifty dollars. On the other hand, the projects from the Brock House work shop are frequently unique items with individual colours, textures and patterns. When these types of crafts are sold at Circle Craft they sell for hundreds of dollars. This sort of high end pricing seems a bit like gouging but at the same time when we consider the time and effort that go into the

crafts, the people working on the items are more likely to feel that their effort was recognized with a reasonable return for Brock House. This is important because many projects take ten to twenty hours. If we were trying to make a living by selling woodwork, we would need to pay a minimum wage of \$12.65 and a business mark up of 50% so the items that took five to ten hours of labour would already need to be priced around \$250. Of course the alternative is to consider that crafts people around the world are applauded but underpaid. As artists using wood, we get to enjoy a modern, well equipped work shop to make hand crafted items that most people seem to appreciate so maybe the price is not important as long as it provides a reasonable return to Brock House so the board continues to support the workshop. I once endured a fifteen-minute YouTube video that promised to explain how to price wooden bowls to learn that bigger bowls should be priced higher than smaller bowls unless the smaller bowl was more attractive. It was not much help. If you have a better suggestion for deciding how to achieve an appropriate pricing for Brock House sales, please contact the Workshop Convener at the Brock House workshop on Thursday mornings or email wramey@mail.ubc.ca with "Brock House Projects" in the subject line.
