From the President's Pen

I'm back from vacation and ready to engage with BHS once more during these last few weeks of 2019. Well as usual there has been a lot happening while I have been away, so let me just bring you up to date.

First of all, the push button bell system that I referred to last time has now been installed at the front door entrance, so any of you who are mobility challenged will have a means of informing the Greeter of your presence. When the button is pressed, it activates a buzzer at the Greeter's desk, which will alert the Greeter, who will assist you with access into the Foyer.

Another item mentioned in the previous Pres. Pen was the reintroduction of the *Walk and Be Seen Program* from last year. This is designed to increase your visibility in low light conditions. So, if you are interested in finding out more about this important safety awareness program, then inform the office and join me in the cafeteria between 1:00 - 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 5.

There have been some questions about the need to increase the Membership fee to \$75.00 for next year. Refer to the detailed account of membership for 2020 [below] and I will elaborate on what I have already stated.

The Board has held the membership fee at \$60.00 for the last 3 years but as we completed the budgetary projections for the next few years it became increasingly clear that we would be accumulating a large operating deficit which would become unsustainable. As you are no doubt aware, we are a nonprofit Society that has a lease agreement with the City of Vancouver. The lease stipulates that we may occupy the building for a nominal fee, but that BHS and the Restaurant are responsible for all of the maintenance and upkeep of this 100 plus year-old building. There are several maintenance issues looming on the horizon and any repairs are complex and very expensive to undertake. We want to be proactive in dealing with them and be able to balance the budget. So, this, along with some other operational cost increases items, are the reasons. And as stated before, the fee is still far less than a weekly cup of coffee at Starbucks.

And in closing I want to remind you that this year's **Christmas Fair** will be on *Saturday, 23 November.* We are looking at ways of making this year's fair more family oriented, so mark it down and join us for an early Ho, Ho, Ho!

A Word About Memberships for 2020

Membership Year: Our membership year is from January 1 to December 31. For the last six years, membership has been steady at 2000 to 2050 members by year-end.

Membership Fees: Our annual fee will be \$75.00.

Membership Categories: We have four types of membership:

Annual Membership (\$75.00) is for members who have reached the age of 55.

Annual Under 55 Membership (\$75.00) is for members who are under the age of 55. However, our bylaws state that "... at no time will the number of members under the age of 55 years exceed more than 20% of the whole membership of the Society. Furthermore, not more than 25% of the directors will be such members".

Annual Subsidized Membership (\$37.50) is for members who are eligible to receive the Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) or its equivalent from the Government of Canada. If you qualify, please phone or go to the office and provide proof of eligibility to a staff member. This fee is set at 50% of the annual fee.

Life Membership (\$5000.00 or more) recognizes members who wish to make a sizeable donation. \$1,000 of the donation is reserved to cover the costs of future membership years. A charitable receipt will be issued for the balance. If you would like to become a Life Member, please phone the Administrator Joanne Enns, 604-228-1461.

New Member Incentive: New members who join between October 15 and December 31 enjoy full membership privileges from the day they join until the end of the following year.

Brock House Artists





November 14 - Dr. Patricia Merivale "Cli-Fi: Where is our 1984 when we need it?"

North American fictions of human-caused climate change stress specific manifestations, like sea-level rise, the deaths of bees, or butterflies, or trees (e.g. Christie's excellent recent *Greenwood*). But two sweeping, almost iconic, climate apocalypses come from (Ghosh's) India and (Wright's) Australia, where, not coincidentally, change is <u>already</u> disastrously manifest.

Dr. Merivale is professor *emerita*, Department of English, UBC.

November 21 - Dr. Mary Davison "Homer's Odyssey: From history to myth and back again."

Aside from being vastly entertaining--full of shipwrecks and sea-monsters, not to mention sexy seductresses and the world's smartest, most ingeniously patient wife--it's also a story of what it means to be civilized, grappling with the monsters within. Beginning with a map of the Mediterranean showing the sites and sea-routes cited in the poem, the talk will briefly review what archaeologists have discovered, then focus on the story itself, including the shifts in gender stereotyping, both male and female, between 1200 and 450 BC--and the reasons why all the Homeric poems have been treated as textbooks ever since.

Dr. Davison's academic research is extensive. She has taught at Stanford, Berkeley and McGill, where, besides her expertise on Shakespeare she was also known as a Greek scholar.

The Library

Brock House library's main goal is to provide BHS members with an attractive collection of current fiction, mysteries and nonfiction. Most of the books come from generous donations by our members (I bought it, I read it and now I do not want to keep it). A big thanks to all who give us books to share and make our library useful and used! Our other goal is to collect saleable books for our semi-annual book sales at Brock House fairs.

In line with our goals, the library team accepts donations that meet these criteria:

*fiction (no more than 5 years since publication);

*mysteries (no more than 5 years since publication);

*non-fiction: biographies and history only.

Paperbacks are preferred as they take less space and are easier to hold.

The books are processed by our volunteer members, so we ask that no more than 10 books are dropped off at one time. Then our volunteer can process them during one library shift.

On occasion, members wish to donate all their surplus books as they downsize. **We do not accept** this type of donation. The books that do not match our collection needs or sell at the sales create unnecessary work for library volunteers and our wonderful Brock House staff. Imagine having to get 20 boxes upstairs for processing, only to move 17 down again with the extra task of arranging disposal! We have very limited storage and disposal is a problem especially as blue book bins are disappearing.



Brock House author publishes biography of pioneer BC doctor.



Brock House member **Geoff Mynett's** biography of the pioneer doctor Horace Wrinch (1866-1939), Service on the Skeena: Horace Wrinch, Frontier Physician, is being published by Ronsdale Press in mid-November 2019. (www.geoffmynett.com). Geoff is an active member of the Brock House Art Group, with drawings on Brock House cards and a painting in the Calendar (June).

His subject is a pioneer doctor who went to Hazelton as a medical missionary in 1900. Those of you who know the Skeena River region will have heard of Wrinch Memorial Hospital. Built by Dr. Wrinch in 1904, this hospital was important in the development of northern B.C.

In his thirty-six years in Hazelton, Dr. Wrinch was a physician and surgeon, a hospital builder and administrator, a farmer, a Methodist Minister, a magistrate, a mining entrepreneur, two term president of the BC Hospital Association, which he helped found, and a two-term Liberal member in the BC Legislature.

Most notably, he was a passionate advocate for state health insurance. In 1927 and 1928, he proposed measures in the BC Legislature which led in 1936 to the first state health insurance legislation in Canada. While Tommy Douglas was the Father of Health Insurance in Canada, Dr. Wrinch was one of its grandfathers.

This is also a story of a town on the frontier, with bank robberies, murders, prospectors, pack-trains and paddle-wheelers.

When he died in 1939, the *Vancouver Sun* said Dr. Wrinch was "the best known and most beloved man in Northern British Columbia".

Geoff Mynett has lived in Dunbar for the past 30 years. With a passion for history, he has enjoyed researching this biography and also working with *Ronsdale Press* in bringing it to fruition.

Fraudsters use VPD non-emergency number in CRA scam



Vancouver Police are warning the public about a new element to an existing telephone scam where fraudsters use spoofing to display the VPD non-emergency number and pretend to be police officers.

Police have received numerous reports of fraudsters calling Vancouver residents, and representing themselves as VPD or CRA. They demand Bitcoin or gift cards to pay false debts.

"The non-emergency police line is for residents to use to report incidents to the police. The police will never call you from the non-emergency number and will

never solicit payment," says Sergeant Aaron Roed, VPD. "We ask that if you receive a call like this, you hang up immediately and spread the word to friends and family."

In this latest scam, the fraudsters state they are calling from the CRA and ask the victim to look up and provide the number for the police department. The scammers hang up and the victims receive another call, from a person purporting to be a police officer. The number on the call display is the VPD non-emergency line.

The fraudster provides a fake badge number and indicates that the victim's social insurance number has been used to create credit card accounts with substantial balances owing. The victim is told they are responsible for the debt and told to clear it up by providing Bitcoin or gift cards.

Police encourage residents to report scams to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre online or toll free at 1-888-495-8501. The VPD is asking anyone who may have been the victim of fraud to contact VPD at 604-717-3321 or Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477.

Please note the Spanish class in the Games room does not finish until 1:00 p.m. on Tuesdays so the changeover may need a bit of cooperation and understanding.






