#### Letter from Brock House's New President - Carl Jonsson

I have had the honour of being appointed President of Brock House Society effective July 10th, 2020 - replacing Peter Phillips. Peter's 2 year term would normally have ended in the Spring as of our AGM. However, as we did not have the AGM when expected, we asked Peter to stay in office for a few extra months. He will be continuing as a Director, as Past President and as a member of the Executive Committee. I very much look forward to Peter's continuing on our Board and contributing his expertise and experience. With his becoming Past President, BevAnn Lister Dean's position as Past President terminated.

Some other Board and Officer changes have occurred recently as a result of resignations, being:

- Bryan Phenix has been appointed Director, Performing Arts replacing Brenda Clark.
- Sheila Resels has been appointed Director, Membership and 2nd Vice President replacing Jo Pleshakov.
- Conrad Guelke has been appointed 1st Vice President
- Michael Le Bas resigned as Director, Marketing, Communications and Outreach.

I want to particularly thank the Directors who have resigned this year and BevAnn Lister Dean for their many years of dedicated service to Brock House.

As was announced in a recent weekly UPdate, Martin Addison resigned as our Administrator effective July 3rd, 2020. Our Administrative Assistant, Yolanda Bonkowski, has been appointed Acting Administrator while our Board of Directors completes an assessment of the ongoing functions and structure of the Board and Management.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 Annual General Meeting of BHS Members - which would normally have been in March - was delayed until a decision could be made as to how to hold the AGM to make participation by the maximum number of Members possible. We have now scheduled the AGM for September 9th. Assuming that gatherings are still limited to a maximum of 50 people, we are considering the possibility of having a limited number of members participate in the Meeting at Brock House with appropriate spacing with other Members participating on Zoom. When plans are finalized an appropriate Notice of Meeting will be sent out.

As you will have noticed, some of our volunteers and House staff have activated a few programs and the Library has been reopened - with appropriate restrictions as to spacing and other precautions against the pandemic. It is our fervent wish that programs - and fun for our Members - will continue without anyone becoming ill. As you have all been advised repeatedly, please wash your hands often, observe physical distancing and wear a mask when you are in the House and unable to maintain 2 meter spacing.

I was initially appointed to Brock House Board and as 1st Vice President in early 2019. I have very much enjoyed my involvement since then. I have been very impressed with the dedication of the large numbers of volunteers who are involved on the Board and in our many Committees and activities. I am very much looking forward to my new role as your President.



## **A DISTANT PAST - EPIDEMIC and MORE**

Today I am digging into my past regarding an epidemic I have witnessed personally. I have given this memory permission to come forward. This tells a great deal about my early childhood experiences. As you must know, children do not have any control over their world. We are dropped into a space on this planet and it is "sink or swim."

We lived 12 miles from our closest public school and were picked up by a small bus daily. Over my early childhood we had three different bus drivers. At this particular time our driver was a caring, reliable man. Little did we know how important his service was...an essential service in many ways. (This is another story).

At this school in a isolated northern community, teachers seldom stayed for more than one year. We had some of the most interesting skilled adults (teachers) arrive to fill this important role. As I look back, they seemed to be either first year teachers or ones close to retirement. This makes for certain novel conditions.

One of these older teachers with great qualifications, charming personality and good intentions was caught up in the tuberculosis, TB, crisis that hit our community. The date is likely 1950 or there about. We were often all tested. We witnessed some students taken from the class and driven off with our local Health Care Nurse. They would end up in a TB Sanitarium miles from home. At that time, I understood the cure for was rest, eat the best food and live in the sun. Yes, I always imagined beautiful sunny rooms with cheerful nurses dressed in white, handing out vitamins (COD liver oil pills). And, to set the record straight, most of the students who were infected were native. I am not comfortable admitting this but the facts are important to me.

As the epidemic slowed down we started to relax and life was almost back to normal, so we thought.

It became visible to us that our well liked senior teacher was not feeling well during his second year in our community. He often spent Easter in Mexico. When he arrived back to our community he had a dark tan. He was born in France, reminded me of the perfect French Artist with wavy black hair, moustache, lean physique and dressed with a turtleneck and jacket. He always looked fit and well kept. He is one of the most memorable teachers from my early childhood.

During his session we had the best art lessons, singing and given freedom to read and draw if we were finished our assigned work. He taught us to sing "Frère Jacques" in French with the right accent.

In the spring of his second year he became pale, coughed and short tempered. It was not a pretty picture in our classroom. School meant everything to most of us...our chance to meet, socialize and make friends. School was important to many of us and our parents.

Then to our surprise, the community health nurse came to the school, asked to have a word with our teacher. He was removed immediately with little explanation to us. He was stricken with TB and spent several months or longer in a sanitarium. It was a shock to all of us to have him depart so quickly. We all missed him and little was explained to us.

This spring, 2020, with this wild unpredictable virus haunting us, to me there is something familiar happening. The fear, a threat to our future and a helplessness that touches us all in different ways. And, a noticeable silence surrounding all of us.

To produce penicillin in quantities not small, To Chain and Florey this challenge did fall. Funds were available to help them succeed as World War II created a need.


> Born August sixth, eighteen eighty-one, Alexander Fleming was a Scottish farmer's son. Researching influenza was on his mind when he made this monumental find.

#### Collage and more for a "World of Duplicity"

This project, which I entitled "World of Duplicity" takes the concept of collage further, by creating my own painted pieces to collage onto the piece to create a dynamic background.

I took a piece of tissue paper, and used a number 8 round brush to outline a series of squares with a variety of colors: Alizarin Crimson, bronze, Teal, Gold and carbon black.

Textured papers, stencils and stamps were used to embellish the piece with pattern.

Al la Rothko, I divided the piece into two distinct areas, the lower with a focus on red oxide, the upper with cerulean blue and white mixed.

I began building my background with my colorful painted paper and the black and white imagery, thinking of pattern, repetition, and contrast.

Then I applied the collage with matte medium and filled most of the canvas, leaving a border. The "gold" is actually bronze acrylic on tissue paper

gelled to the canvas.

I applied a coat of matte medium over the entire piece once covered with collage.

I took some masking tape and taped off some shapes, and painted in with black, and let dry.

I use interference green or gold with some stamps and textured papers to stamp in pattern, the results are glowing.

I took some titan buff mixed with cerulean blue chromium plus white for a yellow grey hue, and used an old credit card to put in negative space, and let dry.

I chose my focus or theme for my work, such as trees, and leaves. The tree is shown with underground, roots, and upperground leaves of light red and green.

I painted in my focus with titan buff and white and then add interference gold. The horizon line is a piece of patterned paper.

Then I had a glass of Talisker!



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
## Weeding and Reading

## **Jericho Lands Update**



Most of you will have received a copy of the Jericho Lands Community <u>Newsletter</u> from the City. But if the newsletter did not reach your mailbox, do not despair. Just turn on your computer and type in <u>shapeyourcity.ca/jericho-lands</u> to receive a project update, find out who the design team are, and be introduced to the cultural liaisons from the First Nations majority owners of the Lands. There is even a picture of the Jericho Lands Working Group on which I serve. Can you spot me?

The online site has a survey which I urge you to fill out. Make your opinion known on the Draft Guiding Principles for this world class project.

The Draft Guiding Principles emphasize reconciliation, respect for the land and a welcome to all cultures. They also speak of responding to the climate emergency, preserving the natural environment, connecting to the rest of the city by rapid transit, providing housing choices and creating new facilities for social connections and activities.

On this last point, you might mention in your survey response that recreational facilities will be needed for the expected influx of downsizing seniors to the Lands and that Brock House Society has more than 40 years of experience in serving seniors.

At a recent virtual meeting of the Working Group, we met several members of the design team and learned that, as expected, the COVID-19 emergency and the economic uncertainty are delaying the project. The target for approval of the Policy Statement by City Council has been pushed back from Summer 2021 to the end of 2021. Construction on the Lands is not expected to start until six years from now. The build out of the Lands is anticipated to take 20 to 30 years.

The next meeting of the Working Group will be in September. Until then, I hope everyone has a wonderful but safe summer. And don't forget to fill out the survey.


## **Brock House Chess Players**

Members need to sign in at the greeter's desk, wear masks, and sanitize hands and chess pieces before and after games.


